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
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"Elephants bang into things and are rude and loud" says Buttonhole.

Discussion Points

- Why do you think 'Scribble', 'Buttonhole', 'Dash', and 'Grump' have the names that they do?
- Do you know anyone who has an unusual name?
- How would you describe Scribble?
- Do you sometimes ask the type of questions that Scribble does, for example, do fish get cold?
- Does he do the right thing by inviting Dash to join in? What characteristics does this show?
- Why does Buttonhole worry that there might not be enough crumbs? Is this just a reaction to having someone new around? If so, do you think this is a normal reaction?
- Is Dash a surprising arrival?
- Would you think that elephants could be good at ballet?
- What is Grump doing throughout the story? Why do you think that he doesn't join in with the others?
- Are the mountains, forest, beach and clouds real? Does it matter?

Activities:

- There are instructions at the back of the book on how to make a Scribble hat. You may like to decorate them and have a hat parade.
- Buttonhole is a bright and colourful bird. Using different materials, including bright colourful feathers, make your own 'Buttonhole'
- 'Dancing is just moving with happiness'. Have a dance party with your class. You might also like to wear your Scribble hats that you made.
